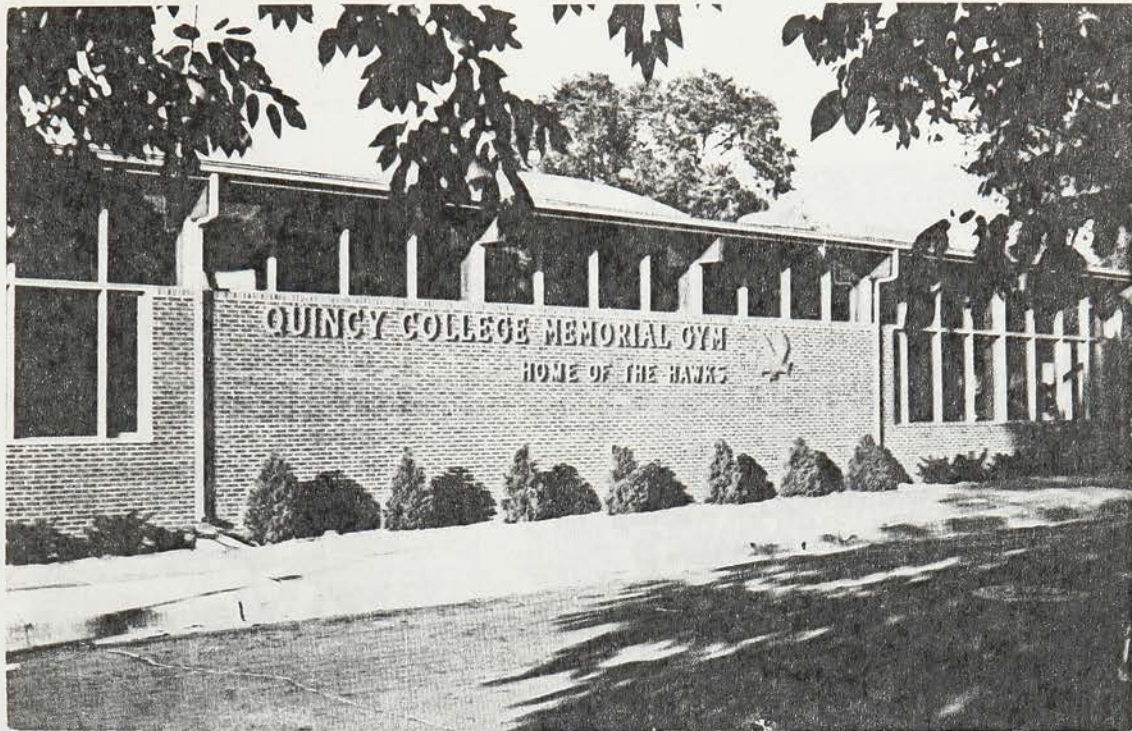




Brenner Library

Containing nearly 200,000 carefully selected books, the library is the academic center of the campus. The subscription list for journals comprises 750 titles of both general and scholarly interest. The library has a rare book collection of about 4,000 volumes including books from the fifteenth century. The Instructional Materials center of print and non-print materials supports the teacher education programs. The library is particularly strong in the humanities. Computerized reference service is available through DIALOG. The library belongs to OCLC (Online Computer Library Center) for cataloging and resource sharing with library holding. The library faculty conducts an on-going program of bibliographic instruction which includes a one-hour credit course in library research.

The Brenner library, often cited for its excellence, is a handsome, comfortable building extensively used by the entire college community.



Quincy College Memorial Gym

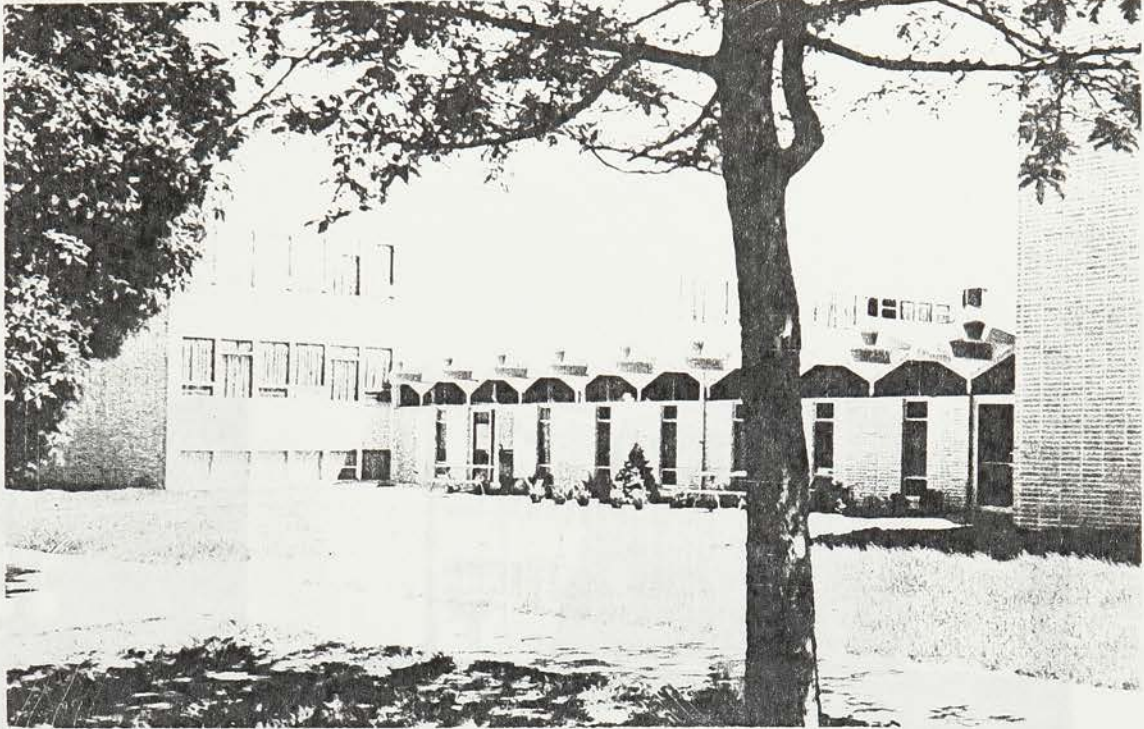

Augustine Hall

Augustine Hall, located in the center of campus, near Padua Hall, has been reopened to accommodate the increased number of resident students. Approximately 35 women will be assigned to the hall.

Augustine has been renovated and is newly painted and refurbished. There is a study lounge, laundry room, large recreational room and formal lounge in the hall. The staff is planning many cooperative activities with the residents of Padua Hall.

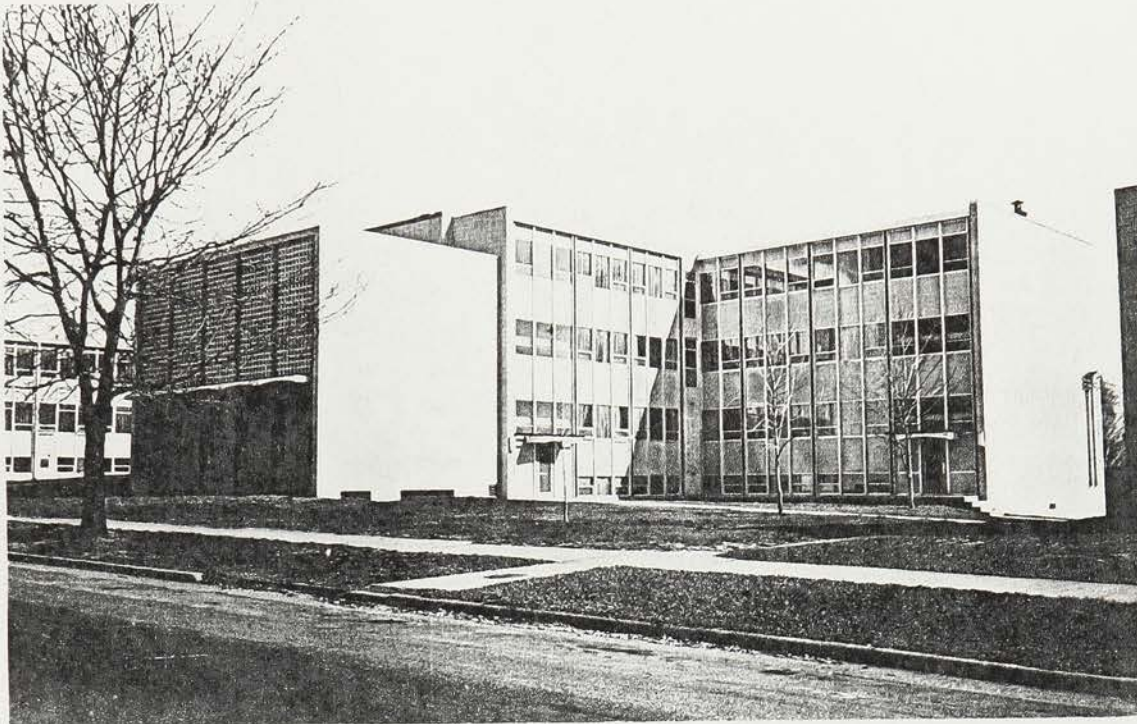


Centennial Hall

Centennial Hall is a two-wing residence hall with men housed in the East Wing and women in the West. The Hall is predominantly freshmen and sophomores although some juniors also choose to live there.

The environment is particularly conducive to developing the individual student's full potential. Although social activities are an integral part of college life, the emphasis here is on recreational, educational, and cultural awareness programs. Each student is encouraged to share his/her special abilities and interests with other residents.

Recreation areas, laundry rooms, study rooms, a kitchen and seminar rooms are provided. Between the two wings is a roomy common lounge with a fireplace. Centennial's courtyard with its volleyball net also helps promote interaction among the residents.



Garner Hall

Garner Hall is a women's residence housing freshmen, sophomores, and a few juniors. The hall has a large, comfortable formal lounge with a fireplace, and a recreation room equipped with a color television and ping-pong table. There are also typing and exercise rooms, a study lounge, laundry room, and a kitchen in the hall. The women also enjoy the private sundeck on the roof.

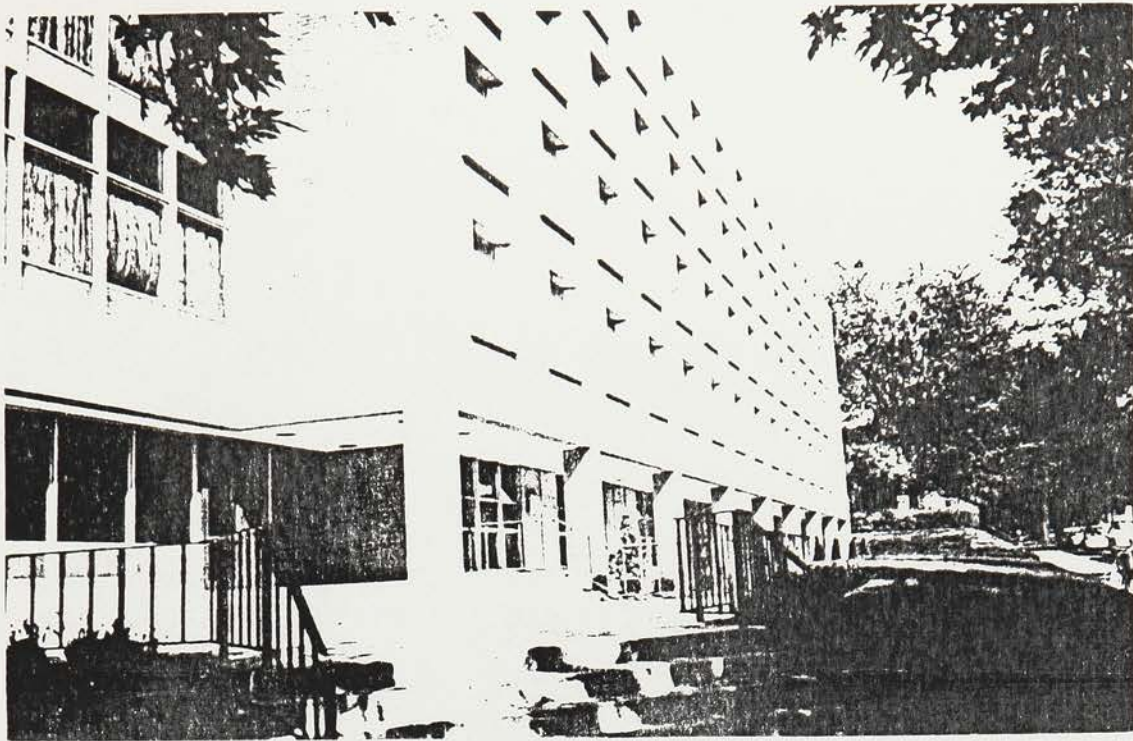
Garner is known for its friendly, homelike atmosphere. For many of the women, it is their first experience living away from home. Much to their surprise, within a month they are calling Garner "home". It has an active hall government which takes a leading role in planning many social, recreational and spiritual activities.



Lind Street Hall

Lind Street Hall is an upperclass residence with two towers of five floors each. Men are housed in the East Tower while the women reside in the West Tower. Unique to Lind Street is the suite living situation. Each tower is divided into nine suites (eight people per suite). Each suite has a central lounge surrounded by four bedrooms and two bathrooms. All rooms are air-conditioned and are carpeted. The two towers share a common lounge and TV room as well as an exercise/weight room and a laundry room.

In many ways, the suites are an ideal environment for upperclassmen. The apartment like atmosphere offers the students the chance to be independent, yet there are still opportunities to participate in the many programs offered by the residence hall staff and student government. These programs are generally geared toward small interest groups and cover a wide variety of educational, social, cultural, and spiritual topics.



Padua Hall

Padua Hall is an all-male residence located in the middle of campus. Although primarily freshmen and sophomores, some upper-classmen also prefer to live in this community atmosphere. Each floor has its own study lounge, although the residents share a common recreation room, laundry room and formal lounge.

It is the aim of Padua Hall to foster a comfortable living environment which supports classroom learning. The residents and staff have created an atmosphere in which personal growth, interaction with others and academic endeavors are all brought together through the community spirit. The personal and spiritual needs of the residents are also facilitated through interaction with three Franciscan who live with the men in Padua. Students are encouraged to assume responsibility for themselves and their living environment.

III. CAMPUS HISTORY

The history of the campus is a story of growth and development. From its humble beginnings in the early 1900s, the institution has expanded its facilities and programs to meet the needs of a changing society. The campus has been a center of learning and research, and has played a significant role in the lives of its students and faculty.

HISTORY OF QUINCY COLLEGE

The College

Quincy College is an independent, Roman Catholic, liberal arts college. It was founded in 1860 by the Franciscan Friars, who have influenced the world by caring about people as people and urging them to fulfill their potential. This spirit is still maintained at Quincy College today. The College, known as the "friendliest college in the Midwest," prides itself on its personal approach to learning. Small classes, a dedicated faculty, close faculty-student relationships, and a warm and personal campus all create an environment conducive to personal growth and development. The college offers courses on both its main campus (50 acres) and the 23 acre North Campus, ten blocks away. Shuttle bus service moves students between these campuses regularly.

The 1,552 students come from diverse social and economic backgrounds. Although the majority are from the Midwest, 25 states and 8 foreign countries are represented in the student body. Quincy College is a residential represented campus, and 71% of the students live on campus. Campus housing options are varied and include single-sex and co-ed residence halls, apartments, and houses. Numerous campus organizations offer unlimited opportunities for students to participate in both college and community activities. A student-operated radio station, music performance groups, publications, honor and service societies, a musical, and concerts are a few of the many extracurricular opportunities available to students. Eighty percent of the students participate in Intra-mural sports. A recreational gymnasium is available for student use. Quincy College also maintains membership in the NCAA. Inter-collegiate sports for men include football, basketball, soccer, baseball, golf, tennis, cross-country, and volleyball. Women's Intercollegiate sports include basketball, cross-country, volleyball, soccer, softball, and tennis.

Career planning and placement counseling is available to students throughout their academic career. Quincy College has an outstanding placement record; more than 90% of graduates are placed in jobs or graduate schools within ninety days of graduation. Individual assistance with academic advisement study skills, and tutorial work, as well as personal and vocational counseling, is provided free of charge.

Location

The college is located in a residential section of Quincy, a city of 50,000 people, situated on the bluffs of the Mississippi River. It is within easy traveling time of St. Louis, Kansas City, and Chicago. Good highways and bus, train, and air service make the area easily accessible from any part of the nation. Quincy has a rich and distinguished tradition in the arts. It is also noted for its fine architecture and extensive park system.

Majors and Degrees

Quincy College awards the Bachelor of Arts (B.A.), Bachelor of Fine Arts (B.F.A.), Bachelor of Science (B.S.), and Bachelor of Science in Nursing (B.S.N.) degrees. Bachelor's degrees are offered in the following subjects; art, art education, biological sciences, (general biology and medical technology), business (accounting, management, marketing, and personnel administration), chemistry, communications, computer science, education (elementary, physical, and speech education-learning disabilities), english, history, humanities (interdisciplinary), music education, nursing, philosophy, political science, psychology, religious education, social work, sociology, and theology.

Minors are available in 23 programs; concentrations are offered in physics and reading. A certificate programs in business and a coaching speciality in physical education are also available.

Preprofessional programs include a two-year pre-engineering sequence, pre-denistry, pre-law, pre-med, pre-veterinary medicine, and nursing.

Academic Programs

The academic program at Quincy College is based on the belief that liberal arts is the most functional and exciting tradition in education. The curriculum is designed to provide students with the fundamentals of a liberal arts education and at the same time prepare them for a rewarding professional and personal life. The flexible curriculum design allows for double majors or major-minor combinations, student-designed majors, independent studies, special topics courses, independent research, practicums and internships are available to meet the special needs of students.

To be eligible for a baccalaurate degree, a student must complete a minimum of 120 semester hours of college courses with at least a C average. The degree program requires 43 semester hours in general education and "tools" courses, 30-33 hours in a major, and at least 36 hours each in distributed electives and upper-level course work.

Quincy College credit can be earned through the Advanced Placement Program College-Level Examination Program, challenge examinations, and, in some cases, academically related experiences.

Off-Campus Arrangements

Arrangements are made with area schools, health facilities, businesses, and industries for such credit-bearing activities as student teaching, clinical training, internships, and practicums. Study abroad is possible through many options, with the academic credit for this study preplanned and integrated into the degree program.

AIRPORT OF THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA

Historically, business has been an integral part of Quincy College since 1867. This is long before business was an active study in many of the larger and more reknown universities. Long before colleges like Harvard or the University of Illinois considered it an academic program.

This is highly unusual, particularly, in a college like Quincy which has a long liberal arts tradition. Many smaller colleges have introduced business programs in recent years, but none have the history of Quincy College.

The rudimentary courses first offered in 1867 have evolved into a rigorous and challenging modern program that attracts upwards of 400 students - half of them women.

Tradition is the basis of all degree offerings. No short-cuts are acceptable. Over 50% of all courses taken at Quincy College will be direct business related courses. The Division of Business believes in teaching students to make a living, whether that process begins for them at graduation or after the completion of post-graduate studies.

Our business program has earned its reputation the hard way. It is relevant and contemporary because it is geared to the business world itself. We are constantly renewing and updating ourselves in order to meet the needs of a changing environment.

As you can see we are proud of our heritage and we intend to maintain the academic integrity of the business of making present and future students proud of graduating from Quincy College.

In 1985, Quincy College introduced its first graduate program, The Master of Business Administration Degree. The degree program is offered to service the area's business professionals.

HISTORY OF THE COLONY

On September 16, 1988, Mr. Richard Magliari, Head of Quincy College's Division of Business, announced to his senior Labor Economics class that he was looking for volunteers to research and start up a Business Club. Jennifer Blair, Diane Brummel, Patricia Churchill-Loos, Todd Friye, James Garland, Bob Jenkins, and Mike Thornhill were chosen on September 21, 1988, to investigate the establishment of a business club or fraternity, depending on what the students wanted. This group of seven quickly formulated a survey to be distributed to students taking business classes. The surveys were collected and tabulated the following week. The results were strongly supportive of establishing a Professional Business Fraternity rather than a Business Club. Meetings with three Professional Business Fraternities, Alpha Kappa Psi, Phi Chi Theta, and Delta Sigma Pi were arranged. After meeting with representatives from all three fraternities, it was decided that Delta Sigma Pi had the most to offer.

The next step was to let the students know what was going on. An informational meeting date was set and the students were notified. Regional Director, Joe Dabrowski, presented to the students what Delta Sigma Pi is all about. During the ensuing weeks before Christmas break, officers were randomly chosen. The initial officers were as follows: President, Jennifer Blair, Senior Vice President, Todd Friye, Vice President for Professional Activities, Patricia Churchill-Loos, Vice President of Chapter Operations, Jim Garland, Vice President of Pledge Education, Bob Jenkins, Secretary, Pat Mahoney, Chancellor, Diane Brummel, Deltasig correspondent, Mike Thornhill.

Meetings were scheduled for 8:00 P.M. every Thursday. At these meetings, committees were formed for different functions. After Christmas, a strong push for recruitment was started. Recruitment activities consisted of: Meet the Club Night, Bring a Friend to a Meeting, and a Saturday Informational Party. These activities helped bring approximately 35 students to our colony before the recruitment deadline of February 28, 1989.

Fundraising ideas were talked over by members and three basic ones were agreed upon. They were the sale of Hawk Towels, Candy Bars, and Desk Blotters. The main purpose behind these fundraisers were to collect enough funds to operate the colony and pay the majority of the cost of individual initiation fees.

At executive meetings early in January, 1989, professional activities gained much attention. Three definite activities were set. They were: Gordon Forbes on a Dress for Success lecture, Dan Dugan on

the Banking Industry, and a Tour of the Chicago Board of Trade and Federal Reserve Bank.

All of these activities were put to specific dates, along with other activities, throughout the Spring Semester of 1989.

Early in the development state of this colony, it was decided that our goal was to be installed at the end of April 1989. In conjunction with this goal, our colony assumed the name Delta Beta Alpha, standing for Dream, Believe, and Achieve.

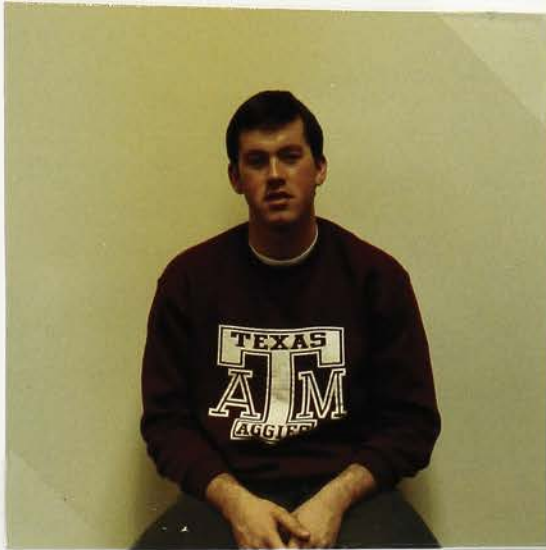

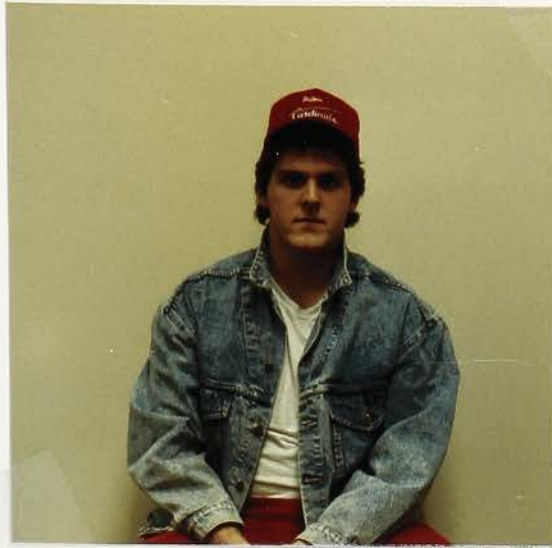
